#### Who is Counted?

Individuals on nonimmigrant visas engaged in temporary academic activities and not enrolled as a student at a higher education institution

Institutions reported data from July 1, 2019 – June 30, 2020




Does reflect scholars impacted by COVID-19



U.S. higher education institutions hosted **123,508** international scholars in 2019/20. The COVID-19 pandemic contributed to a **9.6 percent decrease** from the prior year.

#### COVID-19 resulted in international scholar cancellations and deferrals




4,592 international scholars had planned to come to the United States but canceled their plans.




An additional 5,017 international scholars deferred their travel to a future date.

#### Leading places of origin for international scholars





#### International scholars' leading places of origin trend






#### Change in international scholars by world region





#### Top fields of specialization of international scholars






76% of international scholars specialized in STEM fields.

\*denotes STEM fields of specialization


#### Top fields of specialization of international scholars





94% of U.S. institutions reported providing various supports to assist international scholars in the U.S. during the COVID-19 pandemic.


### Support U.S. institutions provided to international scholars amid COVID-19






95% of U.S. institutions noted multiple factors that will affect scholars coming to the United States in the future.
